CUSTOM MADE

Mike Manzella of Roundup builds top-of-the-line firearms

T in the pines, there lies a haven for any and all gun lovers, a man cave with the finest machinery.

The site belongs to Mike Manzella, co-founder and operator of Manzella Precision, a business that specializes in machining solutions and custom bolt-action rifles.

When Mike started machining school in May 2013, he knew right away he wanted to make rifles, a career choice directly influenced by his own experience buying a custommade .30-06.

"It was everything I wanted and more," Mike said. "I was so happy with it I thought, 'what would be better than to be in this industry and build these rifles for others?'"

Originally from Buffalo, New York, Mike is excited to start a new life in the Treasure State, and share his trade with the gun enthusiasts of the area. He has a lot to offer, be it Glock work (slides, RMR), Remington Recoil Logs, Cerakote services, chambering, thread work, reloading blocks, custom pillar bedding, and the list goes on.

The fact Mike can work on guns for a living continues to amaze him, especially when he thinks back to the skepticism early on.

"My manual machining class teacher at Erie Community College was a mold maker for Fisher-Price," Mike said. "Anybody that grew up

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with Fisher-Price farm toys knows his work. I mean...he's a guy who has made molds that have touched all of America. Anyway, he asked me what it was I wanted to do when I got out of machining school, and I told him I wanted to build rifles. He told me he'd had 10,000 students go through here and he hadn't seen anybody good enough to build rifles."

Self-motivated, disciplined and determined, Mike would not be deterred.

"The man said he'd never buy a rifle from me. I said, 'OK, well, I'm still going to do it."

Two years later Mike sold his first rifle...to the teacher who doubted him.

For Mike, there was never any doubt. After his first year at machining school, he took a job with Accuracy International – a high-end sniper rifle production company – which propelled him to where he is now.

"I worked for Accuracy International for three years," Mike said. "In that time, I developed their CNC chambering programs and even chambered the barrels their sponsored U.S. shooting team used. They won several matches over those years. I also did whatever military contract work they had at the time."

Mike was still in school while working at AI. He'd bring barrel work into the shop sometimes, and his Fisher-Price teacher took notice.

"He kind of couldn't believe it," said Mike. "Then one day he came up to me and said, 'why don't you build me a rifle?' And I said, 'I thought you didn't want one.' He still shoots it to this day."

That was all the encouragement Mike needed to pursue his dream.

Manzella Precision, LLC officially started as a part-time endeavor in 2017. Mike has been operating it full-time since the summer of 2019. The shop is complete, and he is taking on new business regularly.

Mike said those who come see his shop are almost always surprised.

"There's no one in Montana I know of that runs their operation off a CNC machine like I do," Mike said. "People leave here saying, 'I've never seen custom machine settings like this before. I've never seen CNC machines.' And they can't believe it's in Roundup."

When a person walks into Manzella Precision, the first things they see are his CNC mill turn apparatus and his 12,000-pound slant-bed lathe, a machine Mike considers one of the best out there

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for small-batch manufacturing.

"With a machine like this everything is programmed to do exactly what you want it to," he said. "Manual versus CNC is night and day. The CNC is just so incredibly precise. It never has a bad day."

Making a Life Out West

After a few years at Accuracy International an opportunity came up in South Dakota to do barrel work for TS Customs.

"Taking the job at TS Customs worked out great," Mike said. "Not long after starting I met my wife, Amy, on *farmersonly.com*."

Amy, who was home from a deployment in Afghanistan, said she joined *farmersonly.com* to find a "better quality" man.

"It paid off," she said.

Mike proposed after a month and a half.

"It was a whirlwind romance," he said. "I had money earmarked for the match rifle I was building for myself, and took that money and bought her a ring."

Not long after they got married Amy brought Mike out to Montana. She already owned the home outside Roundup, where they currently reside. Mike fell in love with the area immediately.

"I've never appreciated a place more," he said. "Montana — with its scenery, wildlife and its openness — is like a gift that keeps on giving."

Amy and their children (Skylar and Mike, Jr.) are grateful to have found a home in central Montana.

"We like being out here...away from everything," Mike said.

Now accepting new clients

With Manzella Precision, Mike hopes to bring the same satisfaction he had from the custom .30-06 to all his customers, and he plans on doing so by listening to their needs and expectations.

"If someone wants me to build a rifle, I will build exactly what they want," he said. "I won't push anything on them they don't want. It's a truly custom experience."

Mike said — if he has all the parts – he can have a gun ready in two to two and a half months.

"I can usually get a barrel in a month to a month and a half. The stock is usually the holdup," he said. "I try to get things to my customers as soon as possible. It's been great having more and more local customers from the area, including law enforcement."
